## **ICoN Study**

The ICoN study online surveys about toileting and continence support for young people with neurodisability are now drawing to a close. We have had a great response with 950 people taking part and sharing their views and experiences which is really excellent! Responses came from a mixture of parent carers, health professionals, young people and school and care staff from across the United Kingdom. Analysis of all of the information provided in these surveys will now take place. The systematic review has also been completed, and the findings are being written up. The results from both aspects of the study will be looked at together before we can share the study findings in spring 2020. We will be working with professional, parent carer and young person groups in 2020 to share, discuss and interpret the findings. Thank you to all those that took part! 
