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New and Continuing Projects

We are excited to be starting three new projects this year.

The <u>PROMOTE study</u> aims to improve the quality of life of children who have been treated for brain tumours by changing the way families and clinicians discuss priorities in outpatient consultations. It is led by Prof Colin Kennedy at the University of Southampton.

CASTLE stands for <u>Changing Agendas on Sleep</u>, <u>Treatment and Learning in Childhood Epilepsy</u>. It is a 5 year programme of research led by Prof Deb Pal and Kings College London focusing on the most common type of epilepsy. PenCRU will lead work to identify the best ways to measure health and quality of life outcomes for children with epilepsy.

PenCRU is also part of a team led by Dr Jeremy Parr at Newcastle University that will examine ways to improve eating, drinking and swallowing for children with neurodisability (the FEEDS study).

We're also continuing with our Healthy Parent Carers project: testing a programme to promote health & wellbeing; and also the Hospital Communications study which is piloting a training package for hospital ward staff to improve communication with children in hospital.

'What's the Evidence?'

Our latest summary looked at <u>Snowdrop for Brain Injured Children</u>. We were asked if the Snowdrop programme was likely to be more effective than speech and language therapy to help a child with acquired brain injury understand more and to use speech as their main way of communicating.

We're also currently working on one about Functional Electrical Stimulation to improve gait for children with cerebral palsy, and another on interventions for young people with autism to improve social skills and/or reduce social anxiety.

Paediatric Continence Forum (PCF)

The PCF is a multidisciplinary campaign group whose aim is to raise awareness of bowel and bladder problems in children. They have produced, amongst other things, a NICE accredited Paediatric Continence Commissioning Guide, and a lobbying toolkit for parents who have experienced problems accessing suitable services and support. Nicholas Madden, the Vice-Chair of the PCF and a Paediatric Surgeon/ Urologist, has asked if we could share his request with the Family Faculty. Firstly, they would like to hear about your experiences to help them direct their activities towards the most important areas, and secondly they are able to offer assistance if you feel there are specific issues relating to continence care either of individuals, or groups, which need addressing.
