

# New working group: **Improving Continence**

The National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) is commissioning research to look at the evidence for interventions to improve continence in children with neurodisability. We are putting together an Expression of Interest application to carry out the study with several clinical specialists in the topic. We have created a Family Faculty working group and their first meeting was held in June. This was very helpful for planning how we will approach the research if we are funded. We will find out in the autumn whether the NIHR invite us to submit a full application.

# CATCh-uS project update

The <u>CATCh-uS Project</u> looking at transition for young people with ADHD is now around the mid-way point. The first round of the surveillance study, where clinicians informed us of patient numbers, ended in November 2016. We have conducted 130 interviews with young people, their parents and clinicians; and the online survey, identifying adult ADHD services nationally, was open from June to December 2016.

We are incredibly grateful to the interviewees for giving up their valuable time to talk frankly with Anna and Helen; and their personal impressions of how services, and transition between them, works in practice has been invaluable to us. We received just under 1,500 responses to the mapping survey and we will be producing resources to let people know what is available nationally. The survey will also run again at the beginning of 2018 to see how, if at all, the provision has changed.

A group of parents of young people with ADHD have supported the project so far and we would like to extend the invitation to join the working group to any other young people, or parents of 16-25 year olds, with a confirmed diagnosis of

**ADHD**. The group will be looking predominantly at ways we can use to share the information we have to make it useful and accessible to young people and families, as well as influence future service provision. ## European Academy of Childhood Disability conference



In May, Chris, Stuart and four Family Faculty members travelled to Amsterdam to present at the <u>European Academy of</u> <u>Childhood Disability (EACD)</u> conference. Chris was invited to give a keynote speech on involving families in childhood disability research and prioritising research questions. ## Hospital Communications project update

The <u>Hospital Communications</u> study is ongoing. This project is testing training we developed for hospital ward staff. The aim is to improve communication with disabled children in hospital. We delivered the training at the Royal Devon and Exeter Hospital. Next we want to deliver and evaluate the training in several other hospitals. Helen has put together an application for funding the next stage of the research. Helen has also been out liaising and visiting hospitals keen to try out the training.
